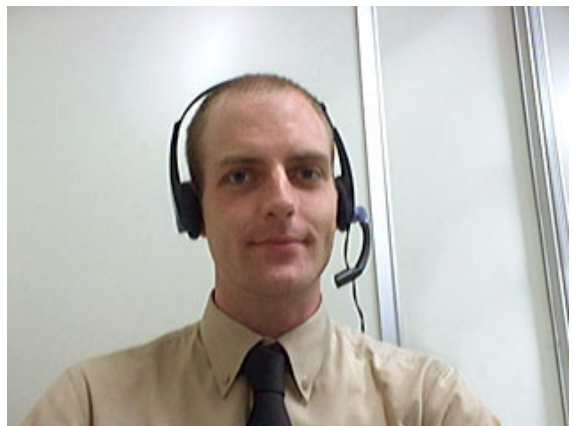

The Nobel Peace Prize

The Nobel Peace Prize is one of the five prizes created by Alfred Nobel, a wealthy Swedish inventor. The other Nobel prizes are given for physics, medicine, chemistry and literature. Every year, the Peace Prize is given to a person or group that promotes friendship and peace between nations and the end of war and violence.

Many people believe that Mr. Nobel established the Peace Prize to compensate for his invention of dynamite and other destructive explosives. By mistake, an obituary was printed in a newspaper while Mr. Nobel was still alive. This obituary criticized Mr. Nobel for his dangerous invention. After reading this, Mr. Nobel decided to create the Peace Prize to help make a more peaceful world.

The first Peace Prize was awarded in 1901 to the founder of the Red Cross. Since then, many famous people have received the prize, including Nelson Mandela, Mother Teresa, Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Dalai Lama. Many organizations have also won the prize, such as UNICEF, the International Red Cross and Amnesty International. The 2006 Peace Prize was recently awarded to Dr. Muhammad Yunus of Bangladesh. Dr. Yunus is the founder of the Grameen Bank, a nonprofit organization that gives loans to poor people in Bangladesh, one of the world's poorest nations.

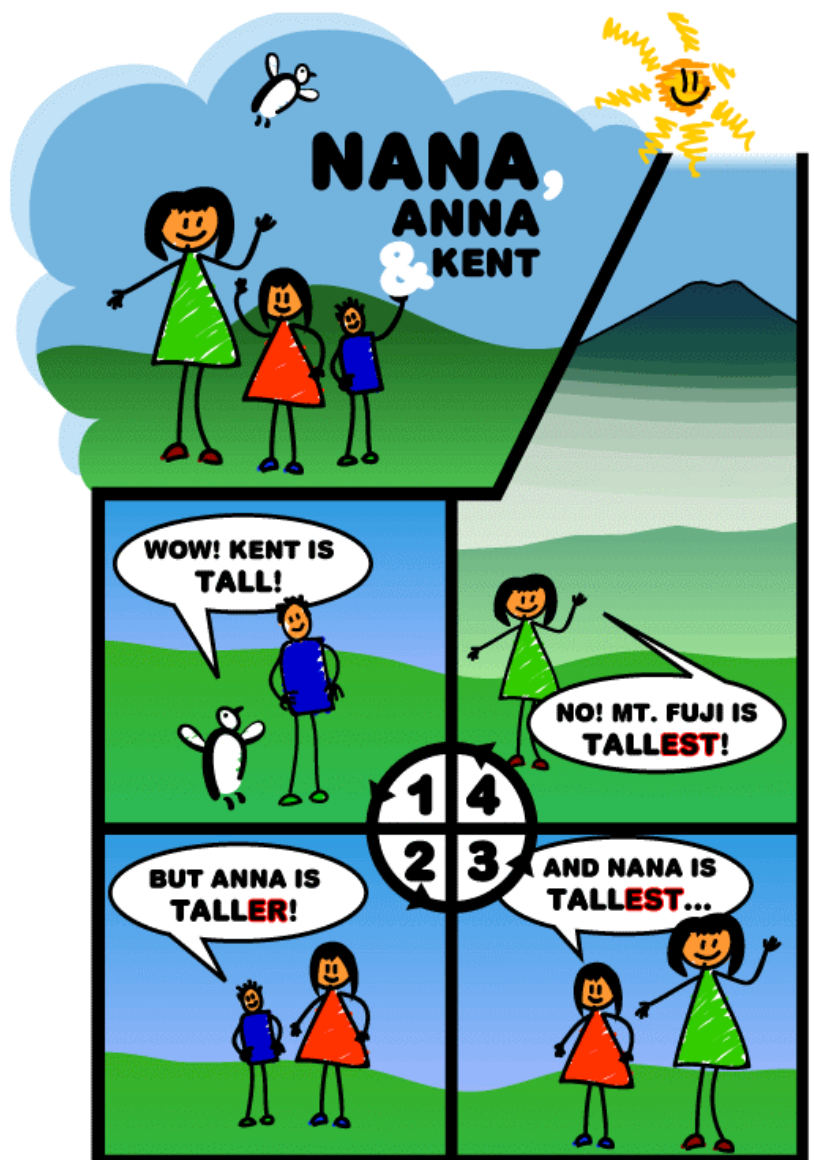
