Movie Review

Mr. and Mrs. Smith

Mr. and Mrs. Smith (starring Angelina Jolie and Brad Pitt) is a movie about two **assassins** that are married to each other, but neither of them knows what the others job is. Mrs. Smith thinks that her husband **runs** a construction company and Mr. Smith thinks that his wife works at an office. In actuality, both Mr. Smith and Mrs. Smith are very successful assassins. When they are hired to kill each other, things get a bit interesting in their rather ordinary **suburban** lives!

Mr. and Mrs. Smith is a movie **loaded** with good action scenes and some good laughs. It also has a few cool *James Bond-like* **gadgets** in it. 1. **assassin** – an assassin is a person that is hired and paid money to kill another person; someone that kills people professionally, for money.
2. **runs** – “He runs a company” means that he is the owner or in charge of the business.
3. **suburb** – an area outside of the main part of the city where people live; houses in the suburbs are generally more expensive and neighborhoods more elite than those in the center of the city.
4. **loaded** – “loaded with good action scenes” means that there are a lot of them.
5. **gadgets** – a small machine or useful item or device. For example, a writing pen that contains a small hidden camera.
6. **shallow** – “the acting was shallow” – this means that there is no real depth to the characters. The characters seem superficial – not like real people.
7. **forced** – “the acting was forced” – this means that it is easy to tell that the actors are acting – it seems rather unnatural.
8. **slow moving** – “the story was slow moving” – similar to boring; not that interesting or time is passing too slowly.
9. **marital counseling** – when a wife and husband go to a counselor to talk about problems in their marriage.

WHY ARE HOLLYWOOD'S GEISHAS CHINESE?

A major Hollywood movie based on a novel written by Arthur Golden about the secret lives of geishas will be released this winter. *Memoirs of a Geisha* is a romantic story focusing on trials and tribulations experienced by a young woman named Sayuri. The novel overwhelmed American audiences, who have been anticipating the movie version for some time. There has been some controversy brewing regarding the casting of this movie, however.

The story mainly revolves around three geishas, who in the movie version, will be portrayed by Chinese actresses. A predominantly Chinese cast will portray geishas, which are a part of Japanese heritage and a symbol of traditional Japan. Some people find this lack of sensitivity in casting highly offensive.

I admit, I do think that this American movie about traditional Japanese culture and history should have had a Japanese female in the role of the geisha. I did find it very awkward that this would not be major point to consider when evaluating the value of the film overseas.

However, I am definitely not surprised that this point would be overlooked. The sad fact is that the majority of Americans cannot tell the difference between Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, etc. The specifics of actually which Asian country you are from is not important to most American audiences. Additionally, most major Hollywood movies don't really pay attention to whether the story is historically accurate, only if the story is exciting or gripping enough. The movie industry makes their money by providing entertainment, not by telling the truth or educating the audience.

The most glaring offense of this controversy for me is not that the actresses are Chinese, but that in Hollywood, high-profile Asian actors or actresses are still sorely under-represented.

New Orleans

New Orleans has a rich and colorful history and has been governed by three nations: France, Spain, and America. New Orleans was founded in 1718 by a French explorer, Jean Baptiste le Moyne. In 1763, the French city was relinquished to Spain as part of an (1) between the two countries for Spain's help in fighting the British in The Seven Years War. However, in 1800, Spain transferred the city back to France and then in 1803, New Orleans, as part of the Louisiana Purchase, was sold by Napoleon to the United States. The city was the site of the Battle of New Orleans (1815) during the War of 1812. During the American Civil War the confederate city was besieged by Union ships under Admiral David Farragut. The confederate city fell to the Union on Apr. 25, 1862.

The city is perhaps most famous for its French Quarter which is the (2) of the original city and contains many of the historic and architecturally significant buildings for which New Orleans is famous. New Orleans is also home to Dixieland Jazz and Blues Music and a (3) known festival called Mardi Gras.

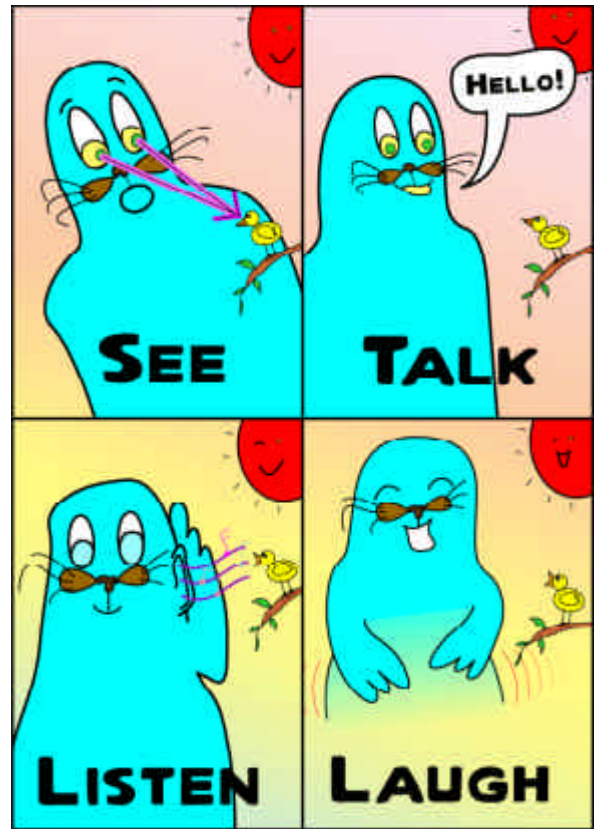
